Contemporary dance company **A.I.M BY KYLE ABRAHAM**, considered "one of the most consistently excellent troupes working today" (The New York Times), provides multifaceted performances, educational programming and community-based workshops across the globe. Led by acclaimed Choreographer and Artistic Director Kyle Abraham's innovative vision, the work is galvanized by Black culture and history and features the rich tapestry of Black and Queer stories and is grounded in a conglomeration of unique perspectives; described by Abraham as a "post-modern gumbo" of movement exploration.

A.I.M is one of the most active touring dance companies in the United States, with an audience base as diverse as A.I.M's movement vocabulary, drawing inspiration from a multitude of sources and dance styles. Since A.I.M's founding in 2006, Abraham has created more than 31 original works for and with the company. To expand its repertoire and offer a breadth of dance work to audiences, A.I.M commissions new works and performs existing works by outside choreographers, such as Trisha Brown, Bebe Miller, Andrea Miller*, Doug Varone, Paul Singh, A.I.M alums Rena Butler*, Maleek Washington, and Keerati Jinakunwiphat.

Kyle Abraham's unique vision and illumination of poignant and relevant issues set him apart from his generation of choreographers as a leading creative force in dance. A.I.M extends this vision and amplifies surrounding artistic voices to share movement and community-based work with audiences around the world.

KYLE ABRAHAM

KYLE ABRAHAM (Founder and Artistic Director, A.I.M by Kyle Abraham; He/Him/His) has premiered his work to international audiences and acclaim since 2006. Abraham has been profiled in Document Journal, Vanity Fair, Ebon Harper's Bazaar, Kinfolk, O Magazine, Paper, Surface, Vogue & Vogue UK, W Magazine, among many other publications. He is the proud recipient of a National Dance Critics Award for Choreography (2024; *Are You in Your Feelings* with Alvin Ailey Dance Theater); Dance Magazine Award (2022); Princess Grace Statue Award (2018); Doris Duke Award (2016) and The MacArthur Fellowship (2013). In addition to performing and developing new works for his company, Abraham has been commissioned by a wide variety of dance companies, including American Ballet Theatre, Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, The National Ballet of Cuba, New York City Ballet, Paul Taylor American Modern Dance and The Royal Ballet. In 2024, Abraham premiered three new works to much acclaim, the evening-length work, *Cassette Vol. 1* in Hamburg, Germany; *Mercurial Son* for American Ballet Theater in October and in December, *Dear Lord, Make Me Beautiful* at the Park Avenue Armory, which Jennifer Homans of The New Yorker called "Extraordinary Dance Memoir."

Abraham has led and curated several performance series including the Danspace Project (2024 / 50th anniversary season) and Lincoln Center's Summer for the City (2023, 2022), among others). In 2020, Abraham was the first ever guest editor for *Dance Magazine*.

He serves as the Claude and Alfred Mann Endowed Professor in Dance at the University of Southern California (USC) Glorya Kaufman School of Dance (2021). Abraham sits on the advisory board for Dance Magazine and Hubbard Street Dance Chicago. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the inaugural Black Genius Brain Trust and the inaugural cohort of the Dorchester Industries Experimental Design Lab, a partnership between the Prada Group, Theaster Gates Studio, Dorchester Industries and Rebuild Foundation.

JAMAAL BOWMAN

JAMAAL BOWMAN (he/him) began his dance training at the age of 14 in Maryland, where he was born and raised. In 2021, he graduated from the University of the Arts in Philadelphia, PA, as a Director's Scholar, under the direction of Donna Faye Burchfield. Over the years he has collaborated with Nora Chipaumire, Tommie Waheed-Evan Maleek Washington, Helen Pickett, Fana Fraser, Jocelyn Cottencin, Nacera Belaza and Sidra Bell. In November 2021, Bowman toured with Von Howard Project to Ecuador to perform in the International Living Arts Festival of Loja. Most recently, he has performed as a company member with Kun-Yang Lin/Dancers for their 2021-2022 Season. His personal practices are centered around queer Black joy, theater, improvisation and comedy. He hopes to reshape the future for queer Black people like him, to give them more opportunities to shine. Bowman joined A.I.M by Kyle Abraham in 2022.

AMARI FRAZIER

AMARI FRAZIER (he/him) is a Chicago native and Chicago Academy for the Arts graduate. He earned his B.F.A. in Dance from The Juilliard School, where he performed works by esteemed choreographers, including Sonya Tayeh, Ohad Naharin, Jawole Willa Jo Zollar, Spenser Theberge and Jermaine Spivey. Frazier has attended summer programs at Alvin Ailey American Dance Theatre, Springboard Danse Montreal and Nederlands Dance Theatre. He worked with Ballet Collective during the summer of 2021 and has continued collaborating with the company on various projects. Frazier's choreographic skills have been showcased in several Juilliard performances, and he will premiere a new work in April 2023 for Juilliard's Senior Production. Frazier joined A.I.M by Kyle Abraham in April 2023.

MYKIAH GOREE

MYKIAH GOREE (he/him), a native of Houston, TX, received his early dance training from Houston Ballet Academy and Kinder HSPVA under the direction of Melissa Bowman and Janie Carothers, respectively. He has attended summer programs with Ballet Austin, BodyTraffic and Peridance. While at Juilliard, he has performed works by Tiler Peck, Rena Butler, Jamar Roberts, Ohad Nahrin, Trisha Brown, Camille A. Brown and Omar Román De Jesús. Mykiah's choreographic work was selected for Juilliard's Choreographers and Composers 2022, MOVE|NYC's summer intensive, Juilliard's Senior Production 2024 and Juilliard's Choreographic Honors. In 2021, Alysia received the Princess Grace Honoraria Award for Dance through Hubbard Street, where she was a company member. Known for her versatility, Alysia has been featured in campaigns with Tory Burch and Adidas. Most recently, Will traveled to Dubai to feature in the country's latest tourism film. A recent graduate from the USC Glorya Kaufman School of Dance, Will received a B.F.A. in Dance under the guidance of individuals including Kyle Abraham, Bret Easterling, Jermaine Spivey, Jodie Gates and William Forsythe. She is a recipient of the prestigious 2019 Princess Grace Foundation Award for Choreography and created works for the National Ballet of Canada, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, Parsons Dance, Charlotte Ballet, Boston Dance Theater, Ballet X, Oregon Ballet Theater, Oklahoma City Ballet, the Lyric Opera of Chicago, Parsons Dance Company, Pony Box Dance Theater, A.I.M by Kyle Abraham, Whim W'Him, Norrdans, San Francisco Opera's Orpheus and Euridice, The New Orleans Museum of Modern Art in collaboration with Academy Award-Winning jazz composer, Terrence Blanchard, CHTV Stories television program in Switzerland, a film portrait for Third Coast Percussion x Devonté Hynes/Blood Orange, The Young Choreographer's Festival in New York, The Juilliard School, Jacob's Pillow Contemporary Summer Program, The Ailey/Fordham School, TEDxChicago Virtual Salon 3.0: Design Your Life and more. She has been spotlighted in Dance Magazine's On The Rise feature in 2013, and the featured cover story in Dance Magazine's November 2021 issue. Butler has taught dance and choreographic workshops at L'Ecole Nationale Supérieure de Danse de Marseille in France, The Macau Cultural Center in China, Ailey Camp Chicago, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and SUNY Purchase Conservatory of Dance. She served on the Consortium for Chicago Dancemakers Forum for three years, was on the annual panel for Black Girls Dance in Chicago, and co-created and directed DanceLab-a free, choreographic course for Chicago teens, empowering participants of varying socioeconomic backgrounds and identities to find commonality in creation. She currently serves on Dancewave's Artistic Advisory Council in New York City.

KEERATI JINAKUNWIPHAT (Guest Choreographer, Someday Soon), originally from Chicago, IL, received her B.F.A. from the Conservatory of Dance at SUNY Purchase and was a recipient of the Adopt-a-Dancer scholarship program. She has additionally studied at the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts, San Francisco Conservatory of Dance and Springboard Danse Montreal. She has worked with and performed works of artists including Kyle Abraham, Nicole von Arx, Trisha Brown, Jasmine Ellis, Hannah Garner, Shannon Gillen, Andrea Miller, Kevin Wynn and Doug Varone. As a freelance choreographer, Jinakunwiphati has presented her own choreographic works at the American Dance Guild Festival, Battery Dance Festival, Dance Gallery Festival, The Joyce Theater, New Victory Theater, Lincoln Center and more. She has been commissioned to set and create works on the Evanston Dance Ensemble, the Martha Graham School, SUNY Purchase College Conservatory of Dance, A.I.M by Kyle Abraham, Houston Contemporary Dance Company, New England Ballet Theatre, Ririe-Woodbury Dance Company, Bang On A Can, Princeton University, PARA.MAR Dance Theatre, Whim W'him Seattle Contemporary Dance and the New York Choreographic Institute. She graced the cover as one of Dance Magazine's "25 to Watch" in 2021. In 2023, Keerati became the first Asian American Woman to be commissioned to choreograph for the New York City Ballet. Keerati Jinakunwiphat joined A.I.M by Kyle Abraham in 2016.

DAN SCULLY (Lighting Designer) is a New York-based lighting and projection designer. He has been the resident lighting designer for A.I.M by Kyle Abraham since its founding, including designs for the full-length evening works *Pavement, Live! The Realest M.C.* and the Bessie Award-winning *The Radio Show.* Recent dance work includes designs for the New York City Ballet, Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, BODYTRAFFIC, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago and Misty Copeland, among others. BRANDON BLACKWOOD (Costume Design, *Someday Soon*) Born and raised in Brooklyn, NY, Brandon Blackwood is the founder, creative director and CEO of his namesake brand. He is a first generation American and was born to Jamaican and Chinese parents. While studying neuroscience at Bard College, he secretly pursued a career in fashion, interning at magazines such as Elle and Nylon. In 2015, while working at a consignment shop, he created a bag for himself (The Portmore) which garnered the attention of an editor at Essence and led to the creation of the brand. His fir collection contained only three styles and the brand has since expanded into over thirty designs which also includes eyewear, swimwear, outerwear and footwear. Every item is influenced by Brandon's personal life named and inspired after his close friends, family or places he lived. Most recently, the brand has moved into custom and has created looks for Serena Williams, Beyonce and Megan Thee Stallion. Blackwood has been featured in The New York Times, Vogue, Vanity Fair, Forbes, Harper's Bazaar, Elle, Instyle, WWD and Marie Claire and is currently found in department stores such as Saks, Nordstrom, Neiman Marcus, KITH and Selfridges.

QUABA VENZA ERNEST (Music Composer, *Someday Soon*) is a multi-genre producer, musician hailing from Brooklyn, NY, with deep roots in St. Lucia. The work he creates seamlessly weaves together a musical tapestry that reflects his diverse influences. Growing up surrounded by the musical heritage of his Caribbean lineage, Quaba developed a profound passion for music at an early age. Immersed in the vibrant music scene of Brooklyn, he honed his skills playing guitar and bass in a jazz band at 92nd St Y, and Harlem School of the Arts. There he explored the intricate rhythms and improvisations that define the genre. This early exposure to jazz laid the foundation for Quaba's versatile and innovative approach to music. His artistic journey is deeply influenced by his father, a seasoned musician who played a pivotal role in the Caribbean touring band, Rain, Drops and Tears. The experiences shared from father to son became integral parts of Quaba's musical identity. In addition to his jazz roots, he draws inspiration from a diverse array of modern-day and historic artists, infusing his sound with the pulsating beats and prowess of hip hop. The fusion of jazz, Caribbean rhythms and hip hop elements creates an authentic and captivating sound that resonates with listeners.

DARRYL J. HOFFMAN (Composer, Shell of A Shell of The Shell) (Bronx, NY) is a composer creative. He developed a curiosity for sound and began creating at the age of 13. Some of his early professional compositions include works for; choreographer Stephanie Martinez and Kansas City Ballet (2016), Visceral Dance Chicago's Synapse (2017), three Philadanco works choreographed by Anthony Burrell & Christopher Huggins (2018-2019), Title IX (2018) and Victoria (2019) choreographed by Emmy Award winning choreographer Ebony Williams, which premiered at Jacob's Pillow. Other musical commissions include; Paramar Dance Theatre's premiere work entitled Kiss, choreographed by Stephanie Martinez, which has also been performed by the Baltimore School for the Arts and Thang Dao's Run(A) Way-a dance film set on Kennesaw State University dance company (which won best original score at the Frost Bite International Online Film Festival. Over the years, Hoffman has developed a partnership with choreographer and Princess Grace Award recipient Rena Butler.
